

Please take care with plants in the house and garden, many plants are poisonous to cats. Lilies have recently been highlighted in the news as even the pollen can be fatal to a cat. If a cat gets lily pollen on its fur & then grooms itself, it can ingest the pollen, this can lead to kidney failure. Other pet species are not thought to be affected, but cats lack certain enzymes, which make them especially vulnerable.

5yrs, female, ginger & white. Kitty originally came into our care when her owner died. Unfortunately in her 2nd home the same thing happened, so poor Kitty is back in care. She is a very timid little cat, who will need a quiet home with someone who has plenty of patience for her to settle.

Tom

7yrs, male, black. Tom's original elderly owner had to move to live with his daughter, but Tom was unhappy with the existing cats in the house and had to come into care. Although shy at first Tom is a very loving cat.

At the moment we have 26 kittens waiting for homes. Only 1 kitten came from a home, the remaining 25 were all feral. Fortunately the majority were caught quite young so were quite easily tamed, although some have been more difficult.


